This seminar will introduce you to key developments in Europe and critically assess the evolution of the European Union (EU). We will begin with major concepts and theories of European integration, then explore the institutions and finally analyze key policies of the EU. Each week we will also discuss current developments in Europe and the European Union such as the impact of the war in Ukraine, migration, and populism. Questions we will address in the seminar include: How has the meaning of Europe changed over time? Why do states transfer sovereignty to the European level? What is the role of EU-institutions? How does the EU cope with current challenges such as security issues, increasing migration, climate change, and the democratic backlash in some member countries? How are transatlantic relations changing and which policies are providing bridges between the two continents?

The key to a successful semester is your active class participation. The format of the seminar includes brief introductory lectures, student's presentations and project work. Please be prepared to contribute to the seminar and participate in our discussions. There will also be some special features such as guest lectures during the semester.

Learning Objectives

- * Study major theories and concepts of European integration and EU-development;
- * Critically reflect upon European politics and the EU from a political science perspective;
- * Understand the workings of EU-institutions and the decision-making processes;
- * Analyze policy issues, including security, migration, and climate change policies;
- * Discuss the causes and consequences of challenges Europe is facing today;
- * Gain a better understanding of transatlantic relations.

Assignments and Grading

1) Assignment 1 (Writing) Two short papers:

a) One short essay on the question: What is Europe? (6-8 pages; with sources). Give your own perspective based on Video in week 1 and readings. (email to <u>lemke@email.unc.edu</u>). Due on Sept. 20, 2023.

b) One short paper on EU-issue critically reflecting on one of the issue areas of the EU (6-8 pages; with sources). Choose your own topic in consultation with the instructor. This paper should be based on your own research.

Due on Dec 1, 2023.

- 2) Assignment 2: Event of the Week presentation. 3-4 minute in-class presentation about a current event in Europe based on a news report. Please sign up for a date in class (one person only). Ideally, the topic chosen relates to the topic of the session. The presenter should be able to answer questions and lead the discussion on the news report. Please prepare one-page handout for the class (including sources you used).
- 3) Assignment 3: In-class group presentation about one of the European institutions (groups of 3-4; max 10-15 minutes per group; with ppt) due week 5, 6, 7. Use website of EU to study role and function; discuss governance and its role in democratic polity. Lead into discussion with questions.
- 4) Assignment 4: Present One Reading (team of two) and lead the discussion once during the semester. Choose one reading from the week's required texts (texts are marked with *), discuss text in team meeting and prepare short power point presentation (5-10 min) about key arguments and findings in text.

Grading

This is a seminar-style course based on active participation. Please come to class fully prepared to discuss the topics of the week and the readings. Your two short papers (Assignment 1) count for 20 percent each (40 percent total). The event of the week (Assignment 2) and the in-class group presentation (Assignment 3) each count for 15 percent (30 percent total). The presentation of the reading (Assignment 4) counts for 20 percent. Regular weekly participation in seminar discussion counts for 10 percent or your grade.
